Motion to accept April, 2019, meeting minutes was seconded and passed.

Treasurer's Report - Steve Baker

The final budget prepared by Steve will be April & May combined as he is stepping down as treasurer at the end of May due to health issues.

Pat Hammel will serve as acting treasurer for the remainder of the year. Trustees have scheduled an audit for June 15, and everything will be turned over at that time.

Budget will be readdressed in June with a priority being to set an allowable low balance for the checking account.


Questions and issues (in no particular order):

Please Won't You Be My Neighbor... 🗞 🙉

Some of us grew up hearing that song sung on the television. Some of us grew up with that as an actual concept—neighbors. I remember growing up in multiple neighborhoods where we knew everyone, and often everyone's business. The Good, The Bad and The Ugly. Today's little towns, burbs, and communities don't often have that sense of community. Some will probably argue and take offense at that, stating that Salem is the exception to that rule, and while I will agree to some extent, I would ask you this: How well do you know your neighbors?

Case in point: Some years back, my parents lived in an upscale Powell, Ohio neighborhood. Do you know what the police eventually found across the street? A meth lab in the basement. Shocker! Everyone in the neighborhood was in shock. Those folks kept to themselves, and although a friendly wave was exchanged every time someone pulled in or out of a driveway, their house was not really visited, nor

were folks invited over for coffee or a beer. Now I'm not saying your next door neighbor is running a meth lab in their basement. What I'm saying is, I believe that the majority of middle America has lost that community feel; that safety of knowing your neighbors; the feeling that if an emergency occurred in the middle of the night, you could knock on any door and your children would feel safe going to their house or they would feel safe if your neighbors had to come over and stay with them while you tended to an emergency.

If I were to ask you how well you know people in the houses on either side of you, what would you say? If I

asked you if you knew the five neighbors to your east, west, north, or south, could you answer that you knew them well? When I moved into this area in 1981, I knew everyone on the block. Now I only know a select few. And although I know some well, and I would recognize most by face because I make it a point to know who comes and goes from my street, there are some whose names I don't even know.

This is not a condemnation by any means, but a question. How important is a neighbor to you? Do you want to know your neighbors? More importantly, do

you want your neighbors to know you? There is a certain sense of safety and camaraderie when we know people in our corner of the world. There is also, of course, an increase in vulnerability with that concept. But with that vulnerability comes close personal friendship.

I used to think the question was, what happened to that sense of neighborliness and how do we get it

back? Now I wonder how many really want it? We seem to live in a world of autonomy and a lot of folks seem very comfortable with that. There are tons of ways to get involved with your neighbors, with your neighborhood. We can attend the civic meetings and meet people, we can make suggestions of events in the neighborhood or even host one. But first we have to decide—how much do we want to know our neighbors, and how much do we want them to know us? I, personally, want to know them, be able to count on them, and I want them to know they can count on me. *How much of a neighbor do you want to be?*




