Some years ago, Keith Garard was walking his dog, Lucy, on a hot day when she simply shut down. She stopped, panting heavily, and would go no further. Keith picked her up and rushed her home, where he was able to cool and hydrate her, thereby averting a dangerous heat stroke. When a similar experience occurred later with another dog, he learned how easily this might occur in the heat of summer.

It dawned on him his home is located pretty centrally to many people's walking loops with their dogs and the simple act of putting out a dish of water for thirsty four-legged passers-by may prevent the potentially life-

threatening situation he had experienced with his dogs. That was three years ago. Although his original (metal) bowl was pretty swiftly scooped up by scrappers, he faithfully puts out a (plastic) bowl in front of his house on Eisenhower Road when the weather turns warm and refreshes

the water each morning and evening until cool weather sets in.

An appreciative neighbor whose dogs frequent the watering dish at Keith's house decided to return the favor. A few weeks ago, she started setting out water in front of her home on Stock Road. She gets a decent amount of traffic from neighborhood dogs, but also sees feral cats and other thirsty wildlife at the dish. In fact, she says she refills it two or three times a day and will continue to do so as long as it's seasonally appropriate.

I heard about Keith's water dish when neighbors Carla and Rick walked by my house with not just their dog, but the two dogs they walk every day for two different neighbors, as well. Talk about a thirsty crew! They had been playing at the school

and Carla said they normally head over to Eisenhower for a drink. I think the dogs would agree it's a long way from Salem School to Eisenhower when you're that thirsty. So I told them I'd start leaving a bowl of water out for them. When I told yet another neighbor about that interaction, she immediately offered to put out water, as she has a double bowl and no longer has dogs. Since I'm off the hook for water, I made her a little sign and the 'Doggy Spot' came to be at Joann Hock's house on Darcy Road.

Keith's thoughtful act of kindness toward dogs has grown into three watering spots—of which I'm aware. On behalf of dogs throughout Salem, I lift a bowl and say, "Thank you!"—and "Cheers!"

- Environmental Court has resumed and the city attorney is litigating cases again.
- Karl Road Library new construction continues while the existing library is now open for limited use—computer lab, copying, librarian assistance with book and audio recommendations—and curbside pick-up and delivery continues. Anyone who needs wifi access can park in the parking lot and use the boosted wifi signal while remaining in your car. Homework Help program will resume in some form, the library is working with Columbus Public Schools and other partners to determine how to do it during COVID-19 school session programming.
- 161 Task Force Saturday morning litter clean-ups have resumed. The next one is September 12, 9 a.m.-noon. Meet behind Jiffy Lube, 1800 E Dublin-Granville Rd. Bring gloves. Grabbers and trash bags will be supplied.
- The City of Columbus is holding a series of Virtual Town Hall Meetings discussing what city departments are focusing on in different parts of the city. Topics will include illegal dumping, neighborhood safety, My Brothers Keeper, Mission Zero, and charter amendments. 

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## Safe Disposal of Household Hazardous Waste

It's always a good time to take inventory of potentially hazardous products that have accumulated throughout your household and decide what you can safely store and what needs to be disposed of. As summer comes to an end, you may find an abundance of old mower gas, paints, stains, pesticides, fertilizers, pool chemicals, CFL light bulbs, and batteries leftover from projects. So now's a great time to go through your basement, garage or storage shed and properly dispose of them or put a plan together of where they should go.

When dealing with potentially hazardous products, the way you dispose of them makes a difference. Hazardous waste disposal is essential for both human and environmental health. Small amounts of hazardous waste being released may not cause an immediate impact, but over time, small releases have the potential to contaminate the environment and have serious health implications. First, look for ways to store excess materials for future use, or perhaps donate what you can't use to your neighbors, family, or friends. If something must be disposed of, check to see if it is considered a hazardous waste. This is easy to do by simply looking for key words of warning, such as: poison, danger, caution, flammable, corrosive, toxic, use in a well-ventilated area, keep out of reach of children or pets. These types of products are considered hazardous and should never be thrown in the trash or poured down a drain, as they can end up contaminating our soil and water.

In Franklin County, the best way for residents to dispose of these household wastes is through mobile collection events or at the Solid Waste Authority of Central Ohio (SWACO) Household Hazardous Waste Center (http://www.swaco.org/195/Household-Hazardous-Waste)





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
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
