Salem Civic Association (SCA) Celebrates National Night Out in Chaseland Park

On Tuesday August 2, 2022, in Chaseland Park in Columbus, Ohio and around the country, neighbors gathered together to celebrate National Night Out, NNO. First launched by the National Association of Town Watch (NATW) in 1984, NNO is "an annual community-building campaign that promotes police-community partnerships and neighborhood camaraderie." According to the NATW, "Millions of neighbors take part in National Night Out across thousands of communities from all fifty states, U.S. territories and military bases worldwide on the first Tuesday in August (Texas and select areas celebrate on the first Tuesday in October)."

According to former U.S. Senator Kay Bailey Hutchison (TX), "The best way to build a safer community is to know your neighbors and your surroundings. National Night Out triumphs over a culture that isolates us from each other and allows us to rediscover our own communities."

Several Salem neighbors (more than 30 by one count)—including the four legged kind—joined the festivities to socialize and enjoy a summer evening out in Chaseland Park. Popsicles and treats were available for all to enjoy as well as a few games of cornhole. Kids enjoyed playing on the playground and swings while parents and other neighbors were able to exchange more than a passing "hello," smile or wave and learn more about their neighbors and neighborhood. Given the city's need for more and more housing, a decision in Salem's favor was never assured but a well-conceived plan, executed to perfection, carried the day. This is a win in which every resident of Salem can take great pride.

But this isn't the only victory Salem residents and your civic association can take pride in, just the latest. Please allow me to highlight the others:

• The City of Columbus thought it would be a good idea to widen Sinclair Road to five lanes from Morse to Huntley Road. After being confronted by concerned Salem neighbors with the amount of damage this scheme would do to the neighborhood, the plan was shelved.

- The city's Safe Streets program (additional police patrols in targeted areas) will start again in July. Seven officers have been assigned to Zone 1 (covers most of Northland) and they will be focusing on parks including Woodward and Innis.
- Number of police calls to nuisance hotels after nuisance abatement have reduced from 4.2 ratio of calls to # of rooms, to 2.3.

- National Church Residences sought to build a twostory elderly housing facility tight against the backyards of our Crawford Avenue neighbors. In the face of dogged determination of the Salem neighborhood to prevent this construction, NCR rethought their location and, appropriately, built their new facility on the north end of Roche Drive, with the approval of the neighborhood.
- After taking stock of the deteriorating condition of Chaseland Park and its playground equipment, the Salem Civic Association approached the Columbus Department of Recreation and Parks for a remedy. As a result, Chaseland is now well-tended, with modern and safe playground equipment.
- When drug dealers began using our neighborhood as a convenient location to conduct their nefarious trade, your Salem Civic Association confronted city leaders and demanded action to throw out the dealers and their attendant petty criminals. As a result, the city's Department of Public Safety and the Columbus Police Department did just that. This action included the closing of five crimeridden hotels to our north as community nuisances. Columbus City Council went further, codifying by ordinance nuisance abatement into


- Columbus hotel licensing laws, helping not only all of Columbus, but other cities around the country who have used this ordinance as a model for their licensing regulations.
- Because of these activities, the Salem Civic Association now has the ear of the City of Columbus, and the Columbus Police Department sends our Community Liaison Officer to each of our association meetings.

Not bad for a quiet little neighborhood, eh? I would like to point out that none of these issues was expected, all were a surprise and, save the watchfulness of our neighbors and the bold voice of our Salem Civic Association, all could have had an entirely different outcome.

Therein lies the importance of an organized neighborhood action under the umbrella of a vibrant and active association. The Salem Civic Association is only as good as the support it receives from you. Your membership in the association tells all comers that Salem is a force to be reckoned with. 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Salem Cats—Part of our Community

There has been a Trap/Neuter/Release (TNR) program in place in Salem for more than twenty-five years. Whether a cat lover or not, the program is beneficial and necessary for the cats and the neighborhood.

Problem: Tame or feral, domestic cats *need* to be spayed and neutered. Why?

Volume: One unspayed female, over seven years, with the normal amount of reproduction and number of birthed kittens, can result in nearly *five thousand* more cats! So, it's easier to start with spaying or neutering the one cat, right?

Condition: Intact (unspayed or unneutered) cats are more likely to roam, fight, and spray strong-smelling urine.

Health: Unspayed or unneutered cats are *far* more likely to develop cancer of certain types. So, if you have an indoor/outdoor or outdoor-only cat, it is wise to spay or neuter to keep the population down *and* protect their health.

What we do: We feed and support the feral cat colonies of Salem. We capture, spay/neuter, and rabies-vaccinate every reported cat, feral or leftbehind cat, one cat at a time. The cat is then returned to its capture spot, as required by Columbus City law. The cat/colony is fed daily and monitored for health issues (to stay within the Columbus Board of Health requirements). It is essential to feed at the same site where the cats live (show up) so that we can find them when we are able to trap them. The cats/colonies are provided with shelter, as it would be cruel to leave them with no shelter. Please remember, they did not choose this life. Important to note is that friendly, adoptable cats, whenever possible, can be placed in good homes. Over the past fifteen years, our team has taken well over 100 cats from the streets and successfully placed them in homes or barns. Many new adult and young cats have been showing up at the colony sites this year, more than in the past ten

years. Normally, this is due to residents moving out and leaving their cats behind. These adults, not fixed, are having kittens and the numbers keep increasing. We are struggling to keep up with getting these cats TNR'd.

What we need:

- Volunteers: to help feed and/or clean/build shelters several times a year.
- Transportation: currently means taking trapped cats to TAHO in Lewis Center (15-20 minute drive) between 8 a.m. and 12 p.m. weekdays on days when they accept TNRs (there are weather restrictions on capturing and releasing for the cats' safety).
- Materials: winterize cat colony shelters—Rubbermaid containers, medium or large styrofoam containers that can be converted to shelters; tarps, straw. Funds: to help fund the TNR procedure, help purchase food, purchase materials for shelters.


Resources we have:

- Cat Welfare (Indianola): provides vouchers, at a cost to us, which permits us to TNR at a discounted rate.
- Colony Cats (Bethel): have taken in several of our friendly feral cats.
- Cozy Cat Cottage (Powell)
- Citizens for Humane Action [(CHA), 3765 Corporate Drive, Westerville].



- Homeless to Home (Marion): have taken in several of our friendly feral cats.
- The Animal Health Organization [(TAHO), Lewis Center]: provides medical care and TNR
 What you can do:
- Contribute financially to the feral cat fund through the Salem Civic Association.
- Support local shelters (no kill) that support us and our furry neighbors.
- Sign up to volunteer with the TNR team—feed (with training), assist with trapping, transport trapped cats to TAHO in Lewis Center between 8 a.m. and 12 p.m., house healing cats prior to release (24 to 72 hours) in quiet safe place until we pick up for release.
- Volunteer or donate to local shelters.
- Signup thru Amazon Smile and Kroger to assist Homeless to Home in Marion (you don't lose your own Kroger points).
- Adopt: many of these cats can be lovely housemates. We will help you with this transition.
- Get your neighbors involved in a positive way. Help them help us—tell them about low cost spay/neuter; help them keep their own pets safe.
- Educate: many people don't know statistics or how to help. Let's help them learn.
- Comingle: understand that these cats are a part of our community. Aggressive TNR and Colony Management is the *only* effective way to help solve the problem. Remember that a benefit of community cats is keeping the rat population at bay.

What not to do:

- Trap cats without assistance/guidance from a seasoned trapper.
- Relocate feral cats on your own. Cats can find their way back to their original home site; it's cruel and counter productive.
- Cause harm to feral cats in any way (it is prosecutable under the law; abuse of domestic animals is a felony in all fifty states)

So, to conclude, some folks love our furry friends (because they keep the rat population at bay and because they love cats); some folks do not like our furry friends because they believe they are a nuisance. Either way, the *solution* is to have a controlled number of feral cats to keep balance. The *problem* is that so many cats are not spayed or neutered when left to roam the neighborhood. The decision is this: Are you part of the problem or part of the solution? The solution is simple; but it takes time, effort and volunteers. Please help us help you keep the balance! Feral Cats - Rae Kirkbride (614) 378-7950; rk@sregroup.com.

She and one other person run Trap/Neuter/Release (TNR) for feral cats in Salem. TNR extremely effective in preventing potentially 5000 cats in the reproductive lifetime of an unspayed female. If feral cats did not exist in the neighborhood, rats would

take over. Cat Welfare provides vouchers for spay/neuter for \$10 and clips ear tips to mark cats as altered. Homeless to Home (Marion) organization takes all cats brought in. Contributions can be made via Kroger/Amazon.

If residents have a problem with feral cats, please call Rae and let her know how you can help. Help is needed to control feral cat population and asking for volunteers:

- Drivers to take captured cats to the vet.
- People to help feed.
- Places/shelters to house cats in winter.

Needed for winter shelter: Rubbermaid containers (with lid); wood pallets; plywood 1/2", 1/4". Contact Rae if you have feral cat on property; they will come and determine if cat is spayed.

Report from the Quarterly Good Neighbor meeting with Community Shelter Board (CSB) and YMCA 6/2/22:

- 1289 Dublin-Granville Rd. is no longer used as covid quarantine location. CSB is in discussion with current owner to explore renovating the site to provide permanent supportive housing facility.
- 1111 Mediterranean Ave. permanent supportive housing site is fully leased (70 units). Homefull will take over delivery of support services, along with continued management of the facility.
- 888 E Dublin Granville Rd. (former Magnusson hotel) has been purchased by a private developer for use as an affordable permanent supported housing residence.YMCA contracted to provide 24/7 front desk staff, security staff, and coordination of access to employment, training, food access, medical and mental health services. The pool/athletic club attached to the former hotel is currently contracted for use by a private swim club.
- Three rooms at America's Best Value Inn on Sinclair Rd are being leased for three clients who need covid quarantine space, with medical and meal services provided.

(pun intended) as were NNO sunglasses and t-shirts. Salem very happily welcomed one particular guest, Police Detective Andrew Rogerson, who was able to join us and meet and greet our residents!

Enhancing the safety of the residents of and visitors to Salem is all of our responsibility. Showing up and participating in NNO is one way to do just that! To that end, Salem residents have been doing a great job looking out for one another. Our Salem Civic Association Facebook page has become a great resource in making Salem residents more aware of any suspicious or other questionable activity in the area. Ring camera footage and cell phone photos,

sometimes shared through the Facebook page, can also be a very helpful tool in preventing and solving crime.

One of the officer positions (i.e., board members) on the SCA board is a Safety Officer, currently Jeffrey Combs. The Safety Officer can help provide support and connect Salem neighbors to appropriate resources to redress safety issues. For example, if you have attended any recent SCA monthly meetings, you know that the non-emergency number for the Columbus Division of Police is 645-4545. It has been stressed at these meetings to notify authorities of criminal or suspicious behavior by either calling 911 or the non-emergency number as appropriate. This sends a clear message to the Columbus Division of Police as well as potential offenders that our community will not tolerate certain behavior.

In addition, quality of life issues can be addressed by calling 311 or by going online and entering in a service request on the 311 Service Portal (www.columbus.gov/311serviceportal). Categories of 311 Service Requests include, but are not limited to, "Animals, Pets, Pests & Wildlife Issues," "City Code



Violations, Noise, Building, and Private Property Zoning Issues," "Homelessness Issues," "Park, Bike Path, Recreation Center, Pool, and Tree Issues," and "Public Safety and Traffic Enforcement Issues."

In addition, the Columbus Division of Police assigns a Community Liaison Officer to various communities in Columbus. The mission of the Community Liaison Unit of the Columbus Division of Police is to "provide law enforcement services to the assigned precincts by collaborating with the public to reduce incidents affecting quality of life issues." Salem's Community Liaison Officer is currently Daniel Yandrich (18th

Precinct). Officer Yandrich is a regular attendee of the monthly SCA meetings at Salem Baptist where he gives an update on crime impacting the neighborhood, crime prevention techniques, and other helpful information. Residents have the ability to ask questions and to further discuss issues that may pose a safety hazard to the community with Office Yandrich and their neighbors. Unfortunately for us, Officer Yandrich is quite popular and was invited to seven (7!) NNO events this year. We hope to get on his calendar in 2023 so that more Salem residents have the opportunity to meet him. In the meantime, everyone is welcome to attend our monthly SCA meetings to meet Officer Yandrich and otherwise become more educated about our community.
