# Elections determine the direction of Salem Civic Association (SCA)



November is election season and it's no different for the Salem Civic Association. What *is* different is that SCA elections involve no partisan politics, no mud-slinging; in fact, no campaigning whatsoever. They also often suffer from a distinct lack of candidates. Meaning, we do not have people volunteering to hold positions on the board.

Nearly all the current officers have hit their term limits. That means that while they have generously continued to serve in their positions because no one volunteered to run to replace them, they can no longer extend their seats even if they are willing to do so.

The last few years we have had positions go completely unfilled. Currently, our Communications Chair is also acting Secretary because no one filled the Secretary position when she moved to fill the Communications position. Our President had been covering the empty Communications position for the previous two years along with her duties as President. Our Vice President doubled as acting Treasurer when that position sat empty.

Clearly, we cannot sustain the association without officers. We cannot expect the same group of people to rotate among the offices. The face of our neighborhood is changing. The face of our association is not. An influx of new people into the neighborhood should mean new faces, new concerns, new ideas in the civic association. SCA represents each person reading this *Lamplighter* and then some, whether you are paid members or not. If *you* want the association to thrive and continue to fight for the safety and integrity of Salem as a family-friendly neighborhood, consider taking a position on the board. Nominations will be accepted at the October meeting or contact an officer.

- America's Best Value Inn on Sinclair Rd has been shut down due to the City Attorney's objection to renewal of their operating license under nuisance abatement ordinance. City put up for sale. Developers will need to take down and rebuild, or comply with nuisance abatement agreement.
- OSU Master Gardeners Program is sponsoring free guided tour of Waterman Farm pollinator and vegetable gardens on Tuesday, August 30 from 6:30-8:00 p.m.
- Columbus Metropolitan Library's K-12 School Help Centers open Monday, Aug. 22. Dedicated after-school spaces give students access to technology, resources and library's catalog of books and materials. Center at Karl Rd. Library will be open Monday-Thursday, 4-7 p.m. and Friday 3-6 p.m.
- COTA's Board of Trustees has approved making COTA Income Assistance Program a permanent benefit for qualifying customers. # Officers of the Salem Civic Association President

Preside at all meetings of the Executive Committee and the Association; ex-officio member of all committees; Speak on the Association's behalf consistent with the objectives and prior resolutions of the Association; Report at General Membership meetings on meetings and discussions since the last General Membership meeting.

### **Vice President**

Fulfill the duties of the President in the President's absence; Assist the President as requested; Preside in the absence of the President; Report on the meetings of the Northland Community Council or other Civic Associations (may be delegated); Serve as the Association's Parliamentarian. (may be delegated).

# **Secretary**

Record and transcribe the minutes of Executive Committee and General Meetings, including attendance of the Officers; Custodian of minutes; Present to the Executive Committee all communications addressed to the Association for their actions.

### **Treasurer**

Make deposits into SCA bank account; Write checks to cover SCA expenses; Maintain SCA financial records (income and expenses) in Excel spreadsheet; Update membership at monthly General Meetings on financial status of SCA; Review financials with SCA board at

monthly board meetings; Help determine annual SCA budget; Verify payment of appropriate SCA membership dues and *Lamplighter* advertisement fees.

### **Communications Officer**

Give notice (via email and Facebook) of all General Membership meetings and other neighborhood-wide events to Salem residents; Supervise preparation and delivery of printed *Lamplighter;* Stuff, count out and bag *Lamplighters* according to delivery routes; Notify delivery personnel that *Lamplighter* is ready for pickup.

# **Membership Officer**

Keep records and data related to all membership functions; Prepare and issue appropriate membership cards; Maintain and update Association's membership application and membership roster; Coordinate annual and special membership drives.

# **Safety Officer**

Serve as the Association's contact with the Columbus Division of Police and City Code Enforcement Supervisor. Report at General Membership Meetings on issues of importance to the safety, health, and security of neighborhood residents. **Trustee** 

Three trustees serve a three-year term each, to be elected on a rotating basis, one per year. Trustees sit on the Executive Committee and thus, attend board meetings, as well as General Membership meetings.

- Salem Elementary no PTA do not have to have children to lead or participate. Call Allison or Charlene.



# **Community Resilience Starts with Community Connection**

Research suggests that individuals who feel a sense of security, belonging, and trust in their community have better health. We are innately social beings and thrive when we connect in meaningful ways. Community *resilience* starts with community *connections*.

Needed core principles for community connections are satisfied by the Salem Civic Association (SCA):

- Collaboration, such as working to address issues;
- Shared purpose—having a safe, connected community;
- Continued interaction—monthly meetings on the fourth Tuesday of the month;
- Community participation—volunteer opportunities; and
- Inclusion and acceptance of diversity (tolerance of differences).

Four of the top factors for community *resilience* are community networks and relationships, preparedness, communication, and health. These factors are also supported through the involvement of our civic association. The association is a major contributor to networks and relationships, both locally and socially among neighbors; and throughout the city with police, other civic associations, and city officials. SCA also maintains communication through our bi-monthly newsletter, Facebook page, and website.

There are many benefits to a connected community, including local influence, safety, and support. With the





structure of a strong civic association, we were able to influence the outcome of a developer chipping away at the single-family status of our neighborhood and help shut down local crime-ridden hotels. We can learn from each other—how a parent dealt with an issue, how a neighbor handled a repair, gardening tips, etc. We share a tool, baked goods or child care. We also have a greater chance of success—a neighbor may know of an opportunity you had not yet discovered.

With life seeming less predictable, it is helpful to have community connections to support more stability on the home front and in the neighborhood.

Our civic association is at risk of collapse. Presently five of the six SCA officers are up against term limits. As stated by Jake Wheeler (Membership Officer), "Officer responsibilities are not complicated or burdensome and generally take only a few hours a month." Outgoing officers are prepared to help incoming officers to understand what is needed & how to go about it. The November meeting (Tuesday 11/22 7 p.m. at Salem Baptist Church) is when the next election will be held.

It's time to get involved in your civic association. Why not join in the upcoming potluck? It's Tuesday, October 25 at 7 p.m. at Salem Baptist Church on Sinclair Road. It's a Chili/Soup Cook-Off, but any type of dish or dessert (yum!) is welcome. The SCA will host a block party in the spring. I'll be involved with the Block Party planning committee. Please join me! # **Curious Salem**

# What is the Harding Hospital on Dublin Granville Road?

The Harding Hospital campus, located at the corner of Dublin Granville Rd. and Proprietors Rd., is just outside of Salem, but has long been part of the local community, and boasts one of the Ohio History Connection's Ohio Historical Markers. You've likely seen these brown markers all over the state, noting places that "tell the state's history as written by its communities" (Ohio History Connection, ohiohistory.org). To obtain a marker, a local sponsor (historical society, civic organization,

etc.) applies for the program. Approximately twenty new markers are accepted into the program each year.

The Harding Hospital was founded by George T. Harding II, brother of President Warren G. Harding, in 1916 and was initially known as the Indianola Rest House, located on 18th Ave. near Indianola Ave. It then moved just south of Columbus and was renamed the Columbus Rural Rest Home, before outgrowing that location. In 1919, Harding purchased what was originally the Worthington summer estate of businessman John Joyce to house the facility, which became the Harding Sanitarium, later re-named Harding Hospital after its

founder's death in 1934. Joyce had founded a dry goods wholesale business, which became a large retailer with three locations in Columbus and operated from 1866-1928. Harding purchased the property from later owner Lina Hoster, daughter of Columbus Hoster Brewing founder Louis Hoster (Gold Top beer).

Once established in Worthington, the hospital operated at that location until 1999, eventually becoming part of the Ohio State University Medical Center. The Worthington campus was originally fifty acres, with a main building known as the "Lodge" serving many purposes (including meeting space and rooming facility) and other smaller buildings across the property. The Lodge was the location of Warren G. Harding's first public address after becoming the Republican candidate for President in 1920; the Lodge was razed in 1981.

Generations of Hardings contributed to the medical field, particularly regarding mental illness. George T. Harding II was particularly known for pioneering new methods of caring for his patients, including advocating "horticulture therapy" (gardening).

Harding and his wife, Elsie, lived in a house across the street from the hospital. Their house stands on the north side of the street at 430 E. Dublin Granville Road, facing an 1864 brick house that is part of the actual hospital

campus. The Hardings' home is still owned today by the Harding Heritage Foundation. Today, the Ohio State Harding Hospital located at the Wexner Medical Center bears Harding's name and remains a leader in psychiatric and behavioral health services for patients of all age. The Harding Hospital campus in Worthington is currently home to non-profit I Am Boundless, which focuses on caring for individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities.

Video from the Harding Hospital, and featuring Dr. George T. Harding IV (1929-2022), grandson of founder George T. Harding II, is featured in the 2021 Netflix documentary *Monsters Inside: The 24 Faces of Billy Milligan*, which tells the story of infamous Columbus criminal Billy Milligan, who was famous for his diagnosis of multiple personality disorder. Harding treated Milligan in 1977.

Report from the Quarterly Good Neighbor meeting

Report from the Quarterly Good Neighbor meeting with Community Shelter Board (CSB) and YMCA 9/1/22:

1289 Dublin-Granville Rd. no longer being utilized as covid quarantine location for CSB and YMCA clients. CSB is in discussion with current owner to explore renovating the site to provide a permanent supportive housing facility similar to the one at 1111 Mediterranean Ave. Building owner has done structural repairs over the last several months. A change in use of this property would require a zoning variance application to the city and be subject to review by the NCC Development Committee.

**1111 Mediterranean Ave.** permanent supportive housing site is fully leased (70 units) and Homefull now delivers support services along with continued management of the facility. Several residents recently



secured employment. Grocery deliveries from Worthington Food Pantry have been instituted. Seven residents who are registered sex offenders will be relocated to other facilities in the CSB/YMCA system. 888 E Dublin Granville Rd. (former Magnusson hotel) purchased by private developer and is being renovated for use as affordable permanent supported housing residence. Owner is contracting with the YMCA for provision of 24/7 front desk staff, security, and coordination of access to employment, training, food access, medical and mental health services. YMCA will lease up to 100 efficiency apartments as they become available through December, 2023 for clients from the Long Street shelter that is closing and being sold. These residents will be later moved to YMCA's Lockbourne Rd and West Broad St. permanent supportive housing facilities that will be constructed in 2023. The first efficiency apartments were leased in July, apartments will be available as renovations and repairs continue over the next year. Developer is including merging several rooms to become familysize housing units in the development over the next several years. The Affordable Housing Trust provided a \$4.6M loan to Affordable Columbus Housing for the acquisition and renovation of the site.


